Section C – Our Town

22) Describe any one of the four items of sculpture found within ¹/₄ mile of Burnt Mill. One of which was by Barbara Hepworth. There was one in Pitmans Field at the Commonfields end, two in the Stow – one on the wall of the library and one in the square in front of Moot House, and one at Glebelands.

Pitman's Field – Donkey Moot House – Chiron (centaur) ie human head and body of a horse Stow Library – boy eating apple "Contrapuntal Forms" (abstract by Hepworth) at Glebelands

23) Name the String Quartet resident in the town from 1963. The were supported by the Gulbeikian Foundation, and they practiced in an old Launderette in Tany's Dell. The Alberni Quartet – original members Denis Simons, Howard Davis, John White and Gregory Baron

24) What number was the bus that ran from Little Parndon (Canons Gate) to Potter Street (Red Lion) via the Station, Town Centre, The Stow and Brays Grove (The Phoenix)? **805**

25) What was the name of the gloomy shop on the market square (?) which was the offical School Outfitter for Burnt Mill? E P Glanville – later moved to a new location, became trendy and called Eric Glanville

26) What was the name of the pub in the town centre? It changed it's name many times later. The Painted Lady

27) What was the name of the hall almost next door to that pub, and upstairs? It was the largest public hall, totally inadequate for the town but hosted concerts by several well known groups. Stone Cross Hall

28) Which of the following had happened in Harlow by August 1963 when we became Burnt Mill pupils:

a) The Odeon Cinema opened, replacing one in a factory in Templefields. (Saturday Morning Cinema Club was only 6d I think) YES – Feb 1 1960 with "Follow A Star"

b) The first "Department Store" opened, although only the Co-Op. NOT SURE?– this was a bit later I think

c) Princess Alexandra Hospital accepted it's first patients. (Like many of my contempories I

went to Epping to have my adenoids out and it was a grim place indeed) YES – it opened in phases from 1958 but was not completed until 1966!

d) The Swimming Pool on First Avenue was opened. YES – I remember walking past it to school when we still lived in Rivermill

e) The Bowling Alley opened. (I was banned for a while for buggering about) ??? - not sure

f) The Central Library opened. It was wonderful and well funded. You could order any book or record – if they didn't have it they would source it from somewhere. AGAIN NOT SURE g) Young teacher Stan Newens becomes Labour MP for Epping (which then included Harlow) and a Labour government under Harold Wilson took over from 13 years of Tory misrule. (I was very radical in those days but left the Labour party over Iraq.) NO – October 1964

h) The locally well supported Tottenham Hotspur win the first double of the 20th Century. YES -

1961

I) The striking new Harlow Town station, for which the entire village of Burnt Mill complete with 3 shops and a chapel was demolished, opens for business. Electric trains replace steam. completed 1960

YES – completed 1960

j) An Indoor Sports Centre is opened on the "Sportscentre" site, which previously was just a cricket field, a running track and field and a few concrete huts to change in. Of course the entire area is now housing. NO – opened in 1964**Section D** – **Growing Up**
